SAUL BEGINS TO LIVE FOR GOD

Sometimes a person may be unkind toward Christians because the Christians seem happy, and he is not happy. He may not say this. In fact, he will probably try to hide his true feelings. However, God created all human beings, and He knows what is going on in the thoughts of each person. The Holy Spirit sometimes causes a person to be unhappy for a while, so that the person will want to know what can cause him to have true joy. The Holy Spirit can persuade someone that to have true joy a person must obey God. That person will obey by asking Jesus to forgive his sin. Next, he will ask what God's will is for his life. According to 2 Corinthians 5:17, he will be a new creature. His life's goals will be changed. He will want to do those things which please God.

In this LIFEPAC® you will read about someone who became a new creature. This true story is described three times in the Bible. More space is given to it than to any other event except the **Crucifixion** and **Resurrection** of the Lord Jesus Christ. This story tells of the **salvation** of Saul of Tarsus who became the **apostle** Paul.

SAUL FORCES CHRISTIANS OUT OF JERUSALEM

Saul had his mind full of plans for getting rid of Christians. He hunted for them. Then he tried to make them say they did not believe in Jesus. He did this by throwing them into prison or threatening to kill them. This **persecution** was so terrible that the

Christians had to leave their homes. They were forced to run away from Jerusalem. Some went far away to Damascus (du mas' kus), Syria. Saul was known as the cruelest enemy of Christians.

Wherever the believers in Jesus went, they continued to tell the true story that Jesus Christ had died on the Cross for sinners and was buried, but God raised Him from the dead. Saul thought they were telling a lie when the Christians said that Jesus

was alive. He did not believe in the **Resurrection** of Jesus. He continued his terrible **threats** to kill Christians because he thought he was doing God a favor by getting rid of these people.

SAUL PLANS A TRIP

Saul planned to travel the one hundred fifty miles to Damascus to capture any followers of Jesus he could find there. Then he hoped to bring them back to Jerusalem to be punished. He didn't expect any problem in carrying out his plan. He was carrying letters from the High **Priest** in Jerusalem. The letters asked rabbis Damascus in the the synagogue to give Saul any help he needed in capturing Christians.

The Christians knew that Saul was on his way there. They knew about the terrible things he had done in Jerusalem. They knew what to expect. They trembled at the thought of his tearing apart or killing their families. Maybe some of them prayed that Saul would come to understand that Jesus had risen from the dead. Do you suppose that some of them were praying that God would change Saul from a hater to a lover of Jesus?

Saul was still thinking of his duty to destroy this Nazarene (naz' uh

ren') teaching. Jesus grew up in Nazareth; therefore, He was called "Jesus of Nazareth" or a "Nazarene." Those who loved Jesus were glad to be called followers of the Nazarene. When His enemies wanted to show how much they hated Jesus and His followers, they called them "Nazarenes."

SAUL TRAVELS TO DAMASCUS

Saul and his group continued to ride toward Damascus. He was going to make the Jewish leaders proud of him. He was planning to march boldly into Damascus!

Saul was not alone as he traveled, but we do not know who traveled with him. Perhaps they were an army of guards from the Temple. Luke, who wrote the book of Acts, where this story is found, does not tell us.

Saul's thoughts were also traveling with him. He thought about the look he had seen on the face of a Christian named Stephen as Stephen was being killed. (Acts 6:8, 10, and 15 and 7:54-60) Saul remembered seeing that same peaceful look on the faces of other believers as they, too were being harmed or killed because they refused to stop believing and obeying Jesus. This peaceful look bothered Saul. Saul did not understand it then, but the Holy Spirit of God was helping them. He did not understand that the Holy Spirit was reminding them of words Jesus had said to them. They were remembering that Jesus had promised they would go to heaven. Saul asked himself why these people were willing to die for this teaching. He wondered why they didn't just "give it up" and live.

He remembered the words Stephen had prayed. Stephen knew he was dying, but he wasn't afraid because he was sure he was going to heaven to be with Jesus. Saul had heard Stephen beg the Lord to forgive those who were killing him. Saul had taken part in the killing. He agreed that Stephen should be killed. In fact, to show how pleased he was about Stephen's death, Saul guarded the robes of the people who threw stones at Stephen. They could not do their hateful work while they were wearing their long robes, and no one could be allowed to steal their clothes. Saul also heard Stephen say, "Look, I see heaven open and Jesus standing at the right

hand of God." Of course, Saul believed that Jesus was still dead.

The Holy Spirit had put these thoughts about Stephen in Saul's



mind as he hurried to Damascus. Saul may have wondered if Gamaliel (gu mā' lē ul), an important teacher, could be right. Gamaliel had said, "If this teaching is of God, nobody can stop it. They will find themselves fighting against God." Saul knew that,

so far, persecution hadn't stopped it. Wherever the Christians went, they were spreading this teaching. The Christians were not silent. But, he would silence them! He insisted that Jesus was not alive.



JESUS SPEAKS TO SAUL

Saul was getting closer and closer to Damascus. Suddenly, a bright light from heaven—brighter than the sun—shined down. It was like a spotlight on Saul. He fell to the ground. Then he heard a voice calling his name, "Saul, Saul, why persecutest thou me?" (Why are you working so hard against me?) Saul answered, "Who art thou, Lord?" (Who is speaking, Lord?) The voice said, "I am Jesus, whom thou persecutest." Saul was trembling and very surprised. Then he said, "Lord,



what wilt thou have me to do?" (Lord, what do You want me to do?) The Lord told him to get up and go into the city and he would be told what he must do. The men who were traveling with him were very surprised. In fact, they were speechless. They had heard a voice but they couldn't understand

the words. They didn't see anyone. They couldn't figure out this event.

When Saul opened his eyes, he couldn't see a thing. He had been blinded by the light from heaven so they had to take him by the hand. They had to *lead* him into the city.


SAUL'S LIFE IS CHANGED

Saul had planned to enter Damascus boldly and proudly. However, he arrived in quite a different way. For three days he was blind. For three days he went without food and drink. He needed this time to

think. Things had happened so suddenly!

He had much to think about. He had kept all of God's laws given in Exodus, Leviticus, Numbers, and Deuteronomy. He had thought that

keeping these laws would get him into heaven.



The scribes studied and taught the Law.

He had also been so proud that he was a Pharisee (far' uh see) and not a Sadducee (sad' see). yu Sadducees, he knew, did not believe in angels. They didn't think there was a life after death or a resurrection. They did not think God was worried about the kind of life they lived. That is why they got as much power and money as they could. Saul was glad the Pharisees were against these ideas. The Pharisees knew that there were angels. They knew people would be raised from the dead. They believed that God judged people after they died according to the kind of life they had lived. That is why they wanted to keep every part of God's Law. In fact, their scribes made laws of their own to try to stop people from breaking God's Law.

Saul was remembering his parents and his home. He knew that his father had started teaching him the Law when he was just three years old. His father probably was a Pharisee. Saul's parents learned and obeyed all the rules. They taught these rules to him. They would not eat eggs a hen laid on the Sabbath. They would not carry a stick or light a fire on the Sabbath. Saul knew his parents had carefully guarded his life against anything that was wrong.

Saul's father had also taught him how to make tents. His parents didn't want their boy to be only a tentmaker, though. They wanted him to be a teacher of the Law of Moses. So, when he was about fourteen years old, they took him to Jerusalem to the synagogue school. His teacher was the important rabbi named Gamaliel.

NOTES

Saul and the other boys sat at the feet of the teacher. There was only one book from which to learn. That was the Old Testament. Saul came to know it well.

Saul thought of Tarsus (tar' sus), the important city where he was born and grew up. The people there were eager to learn. How Saul loved to learn! He learned Greek, the language which the people in Tarsus spoke. Since his family were Jews, they also taught him Hebrew. This was the language spoken and read in the synagogue.

He had thought that all this good training and rule keeping would make him good enough for heaven. Now, the living Jesus had spoken to him and told him that he was working against God not for God. He thought back to some of the Old Testament people who had worked for God. As they obeyed, the Holy Spirit gave them power and made them strong

for God. This experience had happened to Samson, Elijah, and others.

Saul thought about some other things the Old Testament said. He remembered that Moses, the prophets, and the Psalms told that one day a leader chosen by God would come. Until Jesus had spoken to him on the road to Damascus, he thought that Jesus couldn't be this leader because He was dead. Now the Holy Spirit was helping him to understand that this leader was Jesus. Jesus was the Son of God: He did die for sins as the Old Testament said He would (Isaiah 53:6). The Christians were right and he had been wrong.

God knew that Saul had thought he was doing the right thing so Jesus appeared to him. He knew that Saul really wanted to know and to do what was right. Saul wondered what Jesus would want him to do now.

SAUL PREACHES ABOUT JESUS

Ananias went to Straight Street to the house of Judas to find Saul. He did exactly as Jesus had told him. Saul was able to see again, and he was baptized. Right away, there in Damascus, he began to preach that Jesus is God's Son. He surprised people when he began preaching, because they knew that he had come to Damascus to harm people who did that. How he had changed!

Soon the Jewish leaders made a plan to kill Saul because of his preaching. There were guards watching at each gate of the city to kill Saul. The Christians had to let him down in a basket over the city wall. In that way, Saul was able to get away from those who wanted to kill him.

Saul went to Jerusalem, but the Christians were still afraid of him. A Christian named Barnabas had to tell them what had happened to Saul on the Damascus Road. Barnabas also explained how Saul had preached in the name of Jesus. After that, Saul stayed with the Christians. Again he preached boldly about the Crucifixion and Resurrection of the Lord Jesus Christ.



Later Saul was called Paul (Acts 13:13). Because he was sent by the Lord Jesus on a special **mission**, he was also known as the apostle Paul. (1 Corinthians 9:1). Sometimes people call him Saint Paul (St. Paul). As you may know, a saint is a true Christian—a person who belongs to Christ and is set apart for Him.





THE HOLY SPIRIT TEACHES AND USES PAUL

Paul kept on thanking God for his salvation and for choosing him and giving him work to do. Paul said that he did not understand what he was doing when he made the followers of Jesus suffer. Paul continued to tell that Christ Jesus came into the world to save sinners from their sins, and yet he called himself the worst sinner. He said that God used his life to show how long He would wait for even the worst sinner.

The Holy Spirit taught Paul more about Jesus and what God wants. After that, Paul made many exciting missionary journeys to tell others what the Holy Spirit had taught him. In this way, he helped start churches in many different places. The Holy Spirit told him what to write, and Paul wrote letters to these churches. In those letters, called **Epistles**, Paul told Christians what God wanted them to know and do. Those letters of

Romans, First and Second Corinthians, Galatians, Ephesians, Philippians, Colossians, and First and Second Thessalonians are in the New Testament. Letters God told Paul to write to certain people are in the New Testament, too. Paul wrote a letter to Titus, to Philemon, and two letters to Timothy.

Paul suffered because he worked for Jesus. He had many enemies. The Jews especially persecuted him for teaching that Jesus rose from the dead. Paul wrote in 2 Corinthians 11:23–28 that he was robbed, stoned, beaten, and put into prison. Three times he was on ships that were wrecked. None of these things or anything else kept him from telling others that Jesus had died on the Cross for his sins and for their sins. Paul said in Romans 8:35–39 that nothing would keep him from loving Jesus or Jesus from loving him.

PAUL BELONGS TO CHRIST

In LIFEPAC Bible 401, you learned must make this decision before you that you must decide for Christ. You can begin to live for Him. Paul

decided for Christ and then he began immediately to live for Him. He asked, "What wilt thou have me to do?" Later God told Paul to write Ephesians 2:8–10. The Children's New Testament writes these verses this way: "For by His loving favor you have been saved from the penalty of sin through faith. It is not by anything you have done. It is a gift of God. It is not given to you because you worked for it. If you could work for it, you would be proud. We are His work. He has made us

belong to Christ Jesus so we can work for Him. He planned that we should do this."

Paul came to know that before he could work for God, he had to belong to Christ. After that, he could not choose his own way. He had to follow God's plan. Minute after minute, day after day, all the time, whenever he was tempted to take his own way, he remembered that he belonged to God. He followed God's way, because Jesus was his Lord.


